"GOD LED ME HERE FOR A REASON."

hen Phillip left his job as a truck driver, he had some money saved and thought he would find other employment in a reasonable amount of time. Instead, he admits, "I got lost. I wasn't sure of myself anymore. I let time go by, and I ran out of money."

Reduced to living in his car, Phillip sought a new beginning at UGM-TC, where he joined our Men's Program and enrolled in our Skill Building Program. He soon discovered, "People here care about your future. They're happy to see you get back on your feet. The program changes your life. You feel connected again."

Phillip has also strengthened his connection to Christ since coming to the Mission. "Going to chapel every night, and ALPHA [a UGM-TC Bible study program] every week, helped me find myself and made me stronger. God led me here for a reason."

That reason just might be a new career. It's been 35 years since Phillip went to college, but he's ready to learn something new. He has started taking classes at Tarrant County Community College and would like to pursue a career in counseling. "It's a long way from what I was



doing, but it's never too late to do something you want, and I want to help other people."

WOMEN'S PROGRAM

"I CAN THINK ABOUT MY FUTURE NOW."

fter ten years of drug addiction, Breanna lost everything, including her children. At her lowest point, she and her husband were homeless and living in their car. "It was so degrading," Breanna remembers. "We had burned every bridge, every relationship. I couldn't even go to my mom's. Nobody wanted us around."

When she heard about UGM-TC, Breanna was skeptical. "I thought, 'It's a homeless shelter. It's going to be horrible. I'm not going to feel safe.' But when we got here, I never felt more safe!"

While her husband went into the Men's Program, Breanna joined the Women's Program. "It literally saved my life. It sets you up for success." Success for Breanna means remaining sober and regaining custody of her son and daughter. She has already been drug-free for nearly a year and is hopeful about her family's future.

In the meantime, Breanna has rebuilt one bridge she had burned. "My mom said she has never seen such a positive change in me. She said, 'I have my daughter back.' She's so grateful."

Breanna also reconciled with God through ALPHA class and Bible study. "I was just mad at



God. I was empty and trying to fill a void with drugs — it didn't work. When I got here, I had a spiritual awakening. That void is gone; I don't crave drugs anymore. I can think about my future now."

That future, says Breanna, is a stable home for herself, her husband and her children. "This experience brought me to my knees. It humbled me. But now everything is looking up."



FAMILY CENTER

"GOD HAS A PLAN."

olesa, a single mom, was working 50 to 60 hours a week as an Uber and Lyft driver ... until a car accident last November left her without a source of income. She had three teenage children and no savings.

With December rent coming up and no way to pay it, Molesa started looking for a place for her family to stay. She found UGM-TC online. While waiting to see if they got in, she brought her children for Thanksgiving dinner and had a look around. "It was really nice!" she remembers. "Then they called and said we could come in on December 5th. I said, 'Let's do this!"

Since she arrived, Molesa tells us, UGM-TC has exceeded all her expectations. "It was so organized. I like the way the program is set up." She has attended a number of classes, including Financial Literacy, Parenting and Skill Building. She enjoys the Bible study class, ALPHA — especially the discussions — and appreciates how the Mission supports her faith in Christ.

Molesa's children, Sara, Isaiah and Moses, have made friends at the Mission and are thriving in



school. "They have tutoring, and they're in the mentorship program," Molesa says. Being at UGM-TC has brought her family closer by sharing meals and spending leisure time together. "They see me a lot more than when I was driving. We have a schedule."

While at the Mission, Molesa is finishing college, working, saving money and preparing for a job as an accountant. Beyond that, she hopes to open a women's shelter of her own someday. "God has a plan," she says. "Just being here is training me. Can I do something like that? Yeah, I can do it! I'll just take it step by step and watch it grow."



VOLUNTEER PROFILE: BRYCE

hen Bryce's middle school class simulated a night of homelessness to collect donations for UGM-TC, the issue captured her heart. An avid reader, she appreciated the Mission's connection to Same Kind of Different as Me. "I knew it was a special place to host a story of that magnitude."

Bryce saw how one homeless man treasured his three battered paperbacks and began collecting donated books. She approached an architectural firm with the Open Book Project, her vision of providing books to homeless shelters. They created five bookcases, pro bono, for shelters in and around Fort Worth — including UGM-TC.

"Homeless people feel unwelcome in libraries," Bryce explains. The Open Book Project now includes more than 10,000 books for anyone to borrow.

Inspired by her project and by UGM-TC, today Bryce is studying psychology and plans to

promote mental health advocacy through public policy.

"Books bring seemingly different people together," Bryce says.

HEALING SHEPHERD CLINIC

he Healing Shepherd Clinic, established in 2008, is dedicated to providing education, preventative care and medical treatment to homeless individuals in a climate of compassion and dignity.

Homeless men, women and children — even families — are exposed to harsh weather, malnutrition, disease and lack of sanitation. Additionally, many are unaware that they have chronic health conditions like diabetes, heart disease or mental illness. Our services are the first stop for residents experiencing a

health issue, which keeps emergency rooms clear. With your help, Healing Shepherd Clinic cares for the mental, physical and spiritual well-being of our residents and guests.




