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COMMUNITY OUTREACH CENTER

2024 served as the first full year of operations for our new Community Outreach Center. With your help, we were able to:

- Fill 8,575 clothing vouchers from our new warehouse, with a total value of \$214,420
- Host three job fairs and served 215 individuals from those events
- Provide 136 residents with education and training

In addition, we worked with 56 community organizations to provide UGM-TC residents with additional services such as financial literacy, job readiness, work ethics and one-on-one triage sessions.

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TRANSFORMATION STORY: GREG

"I HAVE A WONDERFUL LIFE!"

reg's journey to a new life in Christ started with a big fall from success. He had a great job and plenty of money, but he also had an addiction to alcohol. It cost Greg his job, his home and his family. Sleeping at a truck stop, hungry and alone, Greg had hit rock bottom. "I didn't want to live anymore," he says. "I cried out to God to take me or save me."

God saved Greg — and led him to Union Gospel Mission of Tarrant County. Here, Greg began a sober, godly life. He told his life-change story to the staff, and it went in our newsletter.

Shortly after the release of the newsletter in 2019, his daughter — who had not spoken to Greg in 10 years — saw her father's story on Facebook. Moved by his testimony, she reached out to him.

"My daughter and I reconnected in a wonderful relationship. I can love and play with grand-children I would never have known if it wasn't for UGM-TC," Greg proudly says.

Today, Greg approaches graduation with a degree in psychology and a minor in religion. He works as a House Manager at Cornerstone Assistance Network, where he serves those



in need. "I love to inspire people. I know what rock bottom is, and I want to help others change their life," he says.

Thankful for your support, Greg says. "You help turn homeless people into contributing members of society. I am proof of that and now I have a wonderful life!"



TRANSFORMATION STORY: MISTY

"GOD IS TELLING ME THIS IS MY NEW LIFE!"

fter several years of drug addiction, domestic abuse and homelessness, Misty didn't think her life could get any worse. Then she was arrested and sent to jail. But she believes her incarceration was the beginning of her journey to a new life.

"I read the Bible," Misty remembers. "That's when I really started praying and accepting that this was God's path for me." That path brought Misty to Union Gospel Mission of Tarrant County.

"I loved it from the beginning," Misty says. Staff gave her motivation and encouragement. Classes offered her structure and pattern. Alpha Bible classes and nightly chapel brought her to "a constant, conscious connection with God. I know what it is now to have faith. He wants good for me and He protects me." Misty was baptized in our Deborah Hall Memorial Chapel in December 2023.

Now sober for two years, Misty is working and getting ready to move into her own apartment, but her connection to UGM-TC will continue. "I'll come back to visit. They're like family. God put the right people in my path to bring me peace," she tells us.



Looking back on her journey so far, Misty says, "I feel very blessed to have had all this happen. It was God's perfect timing. It all perfectly aligned with my growth and my spirituality while I was here. God is telling me this is my new life!"



TRANSFORMATION STORY: CARMOSE

"WE HAVE TO LEAVE A LEGACY."

Orn in Haiti and sold into child labor, Carmose felt fortunate to come to the U.S. But she was left to fend for herself at an early age, with no emotional support. As an adult, she turned to crime and the streets to survive.

When Carmose became a mother, she finally understood what love meant. She knew her purpose was to give her son the love and protection she never had. But as the years passed and she gave birth to another son, her circumstances grew worse. Last year, she and her two young children were living in their car.

"It wasn't easy, but we survived," Carmose says. When the family came to Union Gospel Mission of Tarrant County, she felt safe for the first time in her life. "People cared for me, and I trusted them," she tells us.

Carmose's sons, Dakarai, 10, and Daevonn, 5, are thriving. Daevonn had a speech impediment and barely spoke when they arrived. Now, she says, "He's learning to express himself, and it makes him feel good." Inspired by the care her children received, Carmose began mentoring young people at the Mission, and plans to become a youth counselor.



That is the legacy Carmose is building, beginning with her sons. "I want to see them prosper with God as the center of their lives, so when I'm gone, they can keep the legacy going, keep being the great people they are. We have to leave a legacy and we have to do it right."



VOLUNTEER PROFILE

etired teacher Penny Hardy wanted to use her time helping others. Her heart led her to Union Gospel Mission of Tarrant County, where she has served meals for 17 years!

"It warms my heart to make people feel at ease," Penny says. "Some have been coming as long as I've been here. They feel comfortable to talk to me." That connection makes Penny feel she gets much more than she gives. "People ask me if I get paid, and I say I get the paycheck in my heart."

HEALING SHEPHERD CLINIC

he Healing Shepherd Clinic provides education, preventative care and medical treatment to homeless individuals with compassion and dignity. Our services are the first stop for residents experiencing a health issue, keeping emergency rooms clear. With your help, the Clinic cares for the physical and spiritual well-being of our residents.

Every year, Colonial Kids for a Cause (the LemonAid Kids), all high-school age and younger, sell lemonade to support a charity during the Colonial Golf Tournament. As their 2024 charity of choice, more than \$80,000 was raised for Healing Shepherd Clinic!

In 2024, UGM-TC experienced an abundance of blessings in our ministry.

UGM-TC welcomed our very first Women's Ministry Assistant Chaplain, Rev. Ocielia Sprowl. She works alongside Fr. Rogers and Pastor Gregg to provide spiritual support and guidance to the women in our residential programs.

- Over 145 students graduated from the Alpha course.
- A group of talented residents joined forces to start the UGM Choir. The choir gives men and women in our program the opportunity to use their God-given gifts of music to worship and bless the Tarrant County community.
- We began a weekly staff chapel service which features occasional guest speakers, worship leaders and musicians.


